ANNUAL REPORT

2003 - 2004

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1. FROM THE CHAIRPERSON:

This is the fourth annual report in respect of the operations of the Lands and Mining Tribunal.

The Lands and Mining Tribunal came into effect on 1 June 2000 with the appointment of the inaugural Chairperson, Mr David Loadman.

Pursuant to the provisions of the *Lands and Mining Tribunal Act*, other jurisdictions are capable of being vested in the Tribunal. The jurisdiction of the Tribunal currently comprises:

- A: Planning appeals from decisions of the Development Consent Authority;**
- B: Consideration of applications for compulsory land acquisition by the Minister for Lands and Planning and applications for compensation upon such acquisition by the government;**
- C: Determination of applications for compensation under the *Lands Acquisition Act***

Pursuant to the Lands and Mining Act, other jurisdictions may be vested in the Tribunal. Briefly the Tribunal was the nominated body to determine prescribed appeals under the *Swimming Pools Fencing Act*. With the repeal of that legislation, the Tribunal's function as an appellate body terminated.

The Tribunal was approached and has agreed to the adjudication of appeals under the *Heritage Conservation Act*. It is the Chairperson's understanding that the necessary machinery to bring about this situation has not yet been finalised.

The Chairperson reiterates that the vesting of alternative or additional jurisdictions in the Tribunal in his perception can be achieved with considerable savings to the Government. It seems for instance that the infrastructure, the premises and the capacity exist for the Tribunal to be vested with powers of an Administrative Appeals Tribunal, should one be created. Even if the workload increased to the extent that an additional member was required to be appointed to the Lands and Mining Tribunal, it is the perception of the Chairperson that such would be achieved at great cost savings to the Northern Territory.

The Chairperson has communicated to the Attorney-General and others on several occasions perceptions that the Government has the power to involve the Tribunal in various jurisdictions, at a considerable saving to the Government. The Chairperson remains willing and able to discharge additional functions vested in the Tribunal.

3. ADMINISTRATION

The procedure of the Tribunal in this jurisdiction continues to be governed by the Acts, the Rules and Practice Directions.

The Tribunal has issued and amended Practice Directions dealing with its functioning jurisdictions.

The Tribunal has established a Website which contains the Tribunal's Decisions, Practice Directions, Rules, Panels of Mediators and Forms. The Website address is shown at page 2 of this Report.

Mrs Kathy Wadrop is appointed as Registrar of the Tribunal pursuant to section 33(1) of the *Lands and Mining Tribunal Act*. Rachel White has been appointed as the Acting Registrar of the Tribunal due to the Registrar being on leave for twelve months. No further staff have been appointed by the Chairperson.

The staff, comprising the Chairperson and the Registrar, have proved an effective tool in maintaining the streamlined process for the Tribunal's functions, as intended in the legislation. The procedure under the current *Planning Act* for appeals from the Development Consent Authority, which largely obviates oral hearings and requires evidence be in written form, is particularly significant in avoiding lengthy formal hearings and the adduction of oral evidence.

4. FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The financial aspects of the Tribunal's operations are in the hands of the Court Supports Services section of Department of Justice. The financial statements relating discretely to the Tribunal will be published by that Unit as part of its duties.

5. LANDS AND MINING TRIBUNAL ACT

As noted in the Tribunal's Annual Report 2002-2003, the Tribunal has requested some changes be made to the Act, including the change of name proposed, namely "Lands and Planning Tribunal", due to the fact that although there is some abstract relevance of the Mining Act, in practical terms there is no mining related function for this Tribunal. Resolution of this issue seems to be fraught with more difficulty than the Chairperson conceived and has not occurred.

Upon matters, previously dealt with under the provisions of the *Lands Acquisition Act*, being delegated to this Tribunal for disposition, it became apparent that the Tribunal's powers to sanction authoritatively a decision reached solely with the consent of the stakeholders was wanting. Currently, with the assistance of the Attorney-General's Policy Department, this matter has been resolved in concept and the appropriate recommendation made to amend the legislation to expand the power of the Lands and Mining Tribunal Act so as to allow such a course of action.

6. LANDS AND MINING TRIBUNAL RULES

The Rules governing proceedings before the Tribunal are contained in Regulation Gazette 2000 No 51 and commenced on 25 October 2000. There was an amendment to the Rules published in regulation Gazette No 63 and it commenced on 10 January 2001.

Both the *Lands Acquisition Act* and the *Planning Act* have procedural provisions of their own, which in some instances over-ride the Rules of the Tribunal.

7. CHAIRPERSON'S TRAVEL OR ATTENDANCE AT CONFERENCES

In February 2004, the Tribunal received an invitation for the Chairperson to attend the Australasian conference of Planning and Environment Courts and Tribunals ("ACPECT"). The Chairperson attended the ACPECT conference from 25 February to 28 February 2004. The Theme of the Conference was "New forms, existing values". Topics included:

- Modern forms in the landscape;
- Ecotourism and environmental concerns;
- Expert witness procedures – written evidence in chief;
- Lay witness and "expert" opinion;
- Technology in hearings and case management;
- Mediation update;
- The place of Policy.

The topics upon which learned papers were delivered were not always useful in relation to functions to be discharged by this Tribunal in the Northern Territory, but conversely there were valid and interesting papers in respect of issues germane to the exercise of the Tribunal's functions.

8. CHAIRPERSON'S OTHER ACTIVITIES

The Lands and Mining Tribunal was invited to register as a member of the Council of Australasian Tribunals ("COAT") and was formally accepted in March 2003. In August 2003, the Chairperson was invited by His Honour Mr Justice Garry Downes, the President of the Administrative Appeals Tribunal in Sydney, to nominate as the Northern Territory's representative in COAT. Coincidentally the Chairperson met His Honour at the ACPECT conference and some fruitful discussion took place.

The Chairperson accepted the nomination as a member of the governing body of that organisation which had scheduled a meeting of the Heads of Tribunals during the Australian Institute of Judicial Administration Tribunals Conference in Brisbane in June 2004. Unfortunately the Chairperson was not able to attend, but will receive updates and hopefully future invitations.

The Chairperson holds office as Stipendiary Magistrate conjointly with his position as Chairperson. The Chairperson discharges his duties in relation to both those offices as circumstances dictate.

9. TRIBUNAL'S FUNCTIONS

A: PLANNING ACT APPEALS

Pursuant to section 5(1)(j) of the *Lands and Mining Tribunal Act* the Tribunal is charged with discharging the functions of the Planning Appeals Tribunal. The power of the Tribunal to discharge this function is conferred by section 108 of the *Planning Act* NT.

The current panel of mediators maintained pursuant to section 122(1) *Planning Act* is Attachment A to this Report.

The Tribunal reports a continued excellent outcome in the mediation process with an overall success rate of 60%. Mediation has proved a speedy and efficient method of resolving matters.

Where mediation has not been successful, the matter has had to be resolved in accordance with the procedure set out in the Act.

As previously remarked upon this procedure is in the Chairperson's perception, particularly useful in curtailing the length and ambit of the submissions and the procedure. The Chairperson has, pursuant to invitation, made recommendations to the responsible officer for formulation of the intended new planning legislation. A suggestion is that in relation to the intended third party appeals, the same procedure as now exists be employed

and stipulated as necessary by the new legislation for the same reasons already recounted.

Wherever possible and practical in planning appeals, formal “views” of the proposed planning development are scheduled by the Tribunal. Not only the parties but any registered objectors have been invited to attend such views. The “tyranny of distance” can create difficulties in universally adopting this process.

During the first part of the financial year, namely from July 2003 to March 2004, not one planning appeal was filed at the Tribunal. This seemingly excellent record achieved by the Development Consent Authority was not queried by the Registrar of this Tribunal until 9 March 2004 when by chance in a new matter in March 2004 the Registrar discovered that the forms distributed by the Authority since July 2003 had been “reformatted”. The fact of the matter was of course that in such form the “reformatted” forms were not approved as was required by the legislation. More significantly on these “reformatted” forms the applicants were not given the details of their appeal rights nor was there any address or contact details provided of the existence of the Tribunal as the appellate body. Anecdotal evidence seems to indicate that in excess of 200 unapproved forms were dispatched in relation to applications made to the Development Consent Authority.

By letter of the Chairperson dated 12 March 2004 to the Chairman of the Authority, this concern was noted and a reply received 29 March 2004 from the Chairman advised that the matter had been raised with the Department of Infrastructure, Planning and Environment, and immediate steps taken:

- *“Seeking approval of the changed forms*
- *The degree of disadvantage to any applicant is being researched*
- *Legal advice is being sought on the whole matter and the remedies that may be appropriate.”*

It was, and is the opinion of the Chairperson, that each and every decision issued by the Authority should have been re-notified on the approved form.

In any event, some forms at least were re-issued and the Tribunal immediately received a “rush” of new Planning Appeals – 6 appeals in 2 months, which is well above the “norm”.

Since the forms were not approved, there remains an issue in the Chairperson’s view about the validity of the decisions of the Development Consent Authority, refusals having been given on forms which are not approved by the Minister.

Timeline

The average turnaround figure for a Planning Appeal from the date of filing the Notice to Appeal to completion is **68 days**.

B: COMPULSORY LAND ACQUISITION - LANDS ACQUISITION ACT

The Tribunal has continued to discharge the functions specified in sub-section 5(1)(a) of the *Lands and Mining Tribunal Act*, namely to hear and make recommendations about objections to the acquisition of land under the *Lands Acquisition Act*, including objections by registered native title claimants and registered native title bodies corporate.

Although section 37 of the *Lands Acquisition Act* provides for a reference to mediation in sub-section 4A, the Tribunal is unaware of any reference to mediation having occurred pursuant to those provisions.

Sub-section 4 *Lands Acquisition Act* refers to a reference to mediation by agreement. The Tribunal is not aware of any such a reference to date.

Section 37 *Lands Acquisition Act* is a "prescribed provision" pursuant to the provisions of section 36(5) *Lands and Mining Tribunal Act*. For that purpose and in compliance with section 36(3) the Chairperson has appointed a panel of mediators who are willing to act as mediators for the purpose of section 37 *Lands Acquisition Act*. A copy of the current panel of mediators so appointed is included in Attachment A to this Report.

Despite continuing invitations to the parties in the Lands Acquisition jurisdiction to submit their disputes to mediation by the Tribunal, no party has elected to pursue that course.

Applications for Review

The Lands Acquisition Act provides that a person aggrieved by a Ministerial decision to acquire land may apply to the Supreme Court for judicial review of that decision. By sub-section (2A) of section 45A LAA, it is expressly provided such a process does not extend to a review of the decision on its merits.

The Tribunal made a recommendation on 22 March 2003 recommending to the Minister that subject to certain conditions, land the subject of notices of acquire under the Act, be acquired by the Minister. The Minister pursuant to the recommendation gave notice to interested parties of his intention to accept the recommendation. This matter is referred to as “the Griffiths Appeal”.

An application to review the Tribunal’s recommendation and the Minister’s decision in the Griffiths Appeal was lodged at the Supreme Court on 14 May 2002. The matter was argued before His Honour Mr Justice Angel on 24 March 2003 and his decision was reserved. On 31 July 2004 His Honour handed down his decision. His Honour did not deal with the issues which had been ventilated between the parties. His Honour, in essence, said that the Government could not acquire Native Title because it already owned the land.

The Minister lodged an appeal against His Honour’s decision to the Court of Appeal on 19 August 2003 and that decision was handed down on 10 May 2004. In summary the Court of Appeal found that His Honour Mr Justice Angel was in error in his conclusions and proceeded to deal with the merits of the matter. All the grounds of appeal were effectively dismissed. The Court of Appeal found that the Government did have the power to acquire the Native Title discretely even though it owned the land. All other issues raised in the respondent’s grounds of appeal were rejected.

On 7 June 2004, Northern Land Council on behalf of the objectors served the Tribunal with a copy of their application to the High Court, requesting special leave to appeal from the judgement of the NT Supreme Court of Appeal. This application has not yet been dealt with by the High Court.

9. TRIBUNAL’S FUNCTIONS (cont)

C: APPLICATIONS FOR COMPENSATION – LANDS ACQUISITION ACT

Pursuant to section 5 of the *Lands and Mining Tribunal Act*, the Tribunal has various specified functions including determination of applications for compulsory acquisition of land under the *Lands Acquisition Act*.

The first application for compensation arising out of the acquisition of land for the railway corridor was lodged with the Tribunal on 17 February 2003 and the first directions hearing was on 28 March 2003. The claim by the applicant was for compensation amounting to \$10 million. The matter was listed for hearing in February 2004. The parties ultimately reached settlement, the details of which were confidential. Because of the Tribunal's lack of power to

formally sanction settlement the above application to determine compensation and others were withdrawn.

The second matter regarding compensation for \$200,000 was listed for hearing commencing 5 August 2003. This matter was also settled between the parties.

Currently there is a third matter proceeding in the Tribunal, the applicant being Hele Pty Ltd. This matter has been fixed for hearing on 8 November 2004. In respect of this matter, because some step had been taken by the previous Tribunal, the first application had to be withdrawn and re-lodged only after the appropriate notification by the Minister in the Gazette had occurred.

There and still are a number of matters involving applications for compensation filed in the previous Lands Acquisition Tribunal before the year 2000, consequent on compulsory acquisition of land under the *Lands Acquisition Act* which have not been finalised. The Chairperson is unable to conceive why these matters are not simply referred to the Lands and Mining Tribunal since they clearly cannot be finalised under the pre-existing regime.

The Chairperson notes that earlier this year there appeared in "*The Australian*" an article from which it appeared that several claimants were making claims for compensation. Precisely where those claims are being pursued is unclear to the Chairperson, but they are not proceeding before the previous Lands Acquisition Tribunal and certainly are not proceeding in the current tribunal.
