

Prohibited Games

The following games and any variants thereof are prohibited games pursuant to the Gaming Control (Community Gaming) Regulations.

• American Roulette	• Baccarat	• Big Six Wheel (Money Wheel)
• Blackjack	• Craps	• Keno
• Pai Gow	• Poker (all versions)	• Poker Machines
• Sic Bo (Big and Small)	• Two Up (some exemptions apply on special occasions, contact RGL for further information)	

These games and their variants may only be conducted under a licence, for example, by a casino.

They must not be conducted, nor offered, by approved associations undertaking a fundraising activity or by businesses undertaking a promotional activity.

Complaints

1. What do I do if I have concerns about the prohibited games being offered or conducted?

A person may make a written complaint to the Director of Licensing setting out the grounds for the complaint.

The Director of Licensing will consider the nature of the complaint and initiate an investigation into the complaint if necessary.

2. What do I include in my complaint?

As a complainant, you need to make sure you are clear about what you are complaining about. This information will assist the Director of Licensing when investigating your complaint. The types of information that will be relevant include:

- Name of the person or organisation conducting the prohibited game.
- Date and location of the prohibited being conducted.
- How the prohibited game was promoted.
- Permit number (if available).

3. Who do I send the complaint to?

4. What are the penalties for breach of the Gaming Control (Community Gaming) Regulations?

The nature of the complaint and the findings of investigations by the Director will determine the outcome. This could include directions being issued by the Director to either:

- confirm compliance with the Regulations; or
- adopt, vary or cease practice in the conduct of the lottery or game of chance.

Serious breaches of the Act or Regulations may result in a \$2000 fine.
