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## **DETERMINATION REGARDING OUT-OF-BALANCE ENERGY PRICES – 1 JULY 2001 TO 30 JUNE 2002**

In accordance clause 87(6) of the Network Access Code ("the Code"), which is contained in the schedule to the *Electricity Networks (Third Party Access) Act 2000*, the Utilities Commission hereby notifies PAWA Generation that, as no replacement schedule of out-of-balance prices has submitted to the Commission by PAWA Generation, the charges determined by the Commission for the 2000-01 financial year will continue to apply from 1 July 2001.

The Utilities Commission hereby determines that the out-of-balance energy prices to be used by the Power System Controller when calculating out-of-balance charges are to be as set out in Annexure A. These prices are to apply from 1 July 2001 and will cease to have effect on the earlier of 30 June 2002 or the Utilities Commission making a replacement determination or approving prices submitted by PAWA Generation.

## ANNEXURE A

### Out-of-Balance Energy Prices, from 1 July 2001 PAWA Generation

(a) Price at which PAWA Generation will purchase energy when the supply (including allowance for energy losses) from another generator exceeds contract demand over a 15 minute period, by no more than 1.5%, over a fifteen minute period.

(b) Price at which PAWA Generation will purchase energy when the supply (including allowance for energy losses) from another generator exceeds contract demand over a 15 minute period, by greater than 1.5%, over a fifteen minute period.

(c) Price at which PAWA Generation will sell energy when the supply (including allowance for energy losses) from another generator falls short of its customer's maximum demand, by no more than 1.5%, over a fifteen minute period.

(d) Price at which PAWA Generation will sell energy when the supply (including allowance for energy losses) from another generator falls short of its customer's maximum demand, by greater than 1.5%, over a 15 minute period.
